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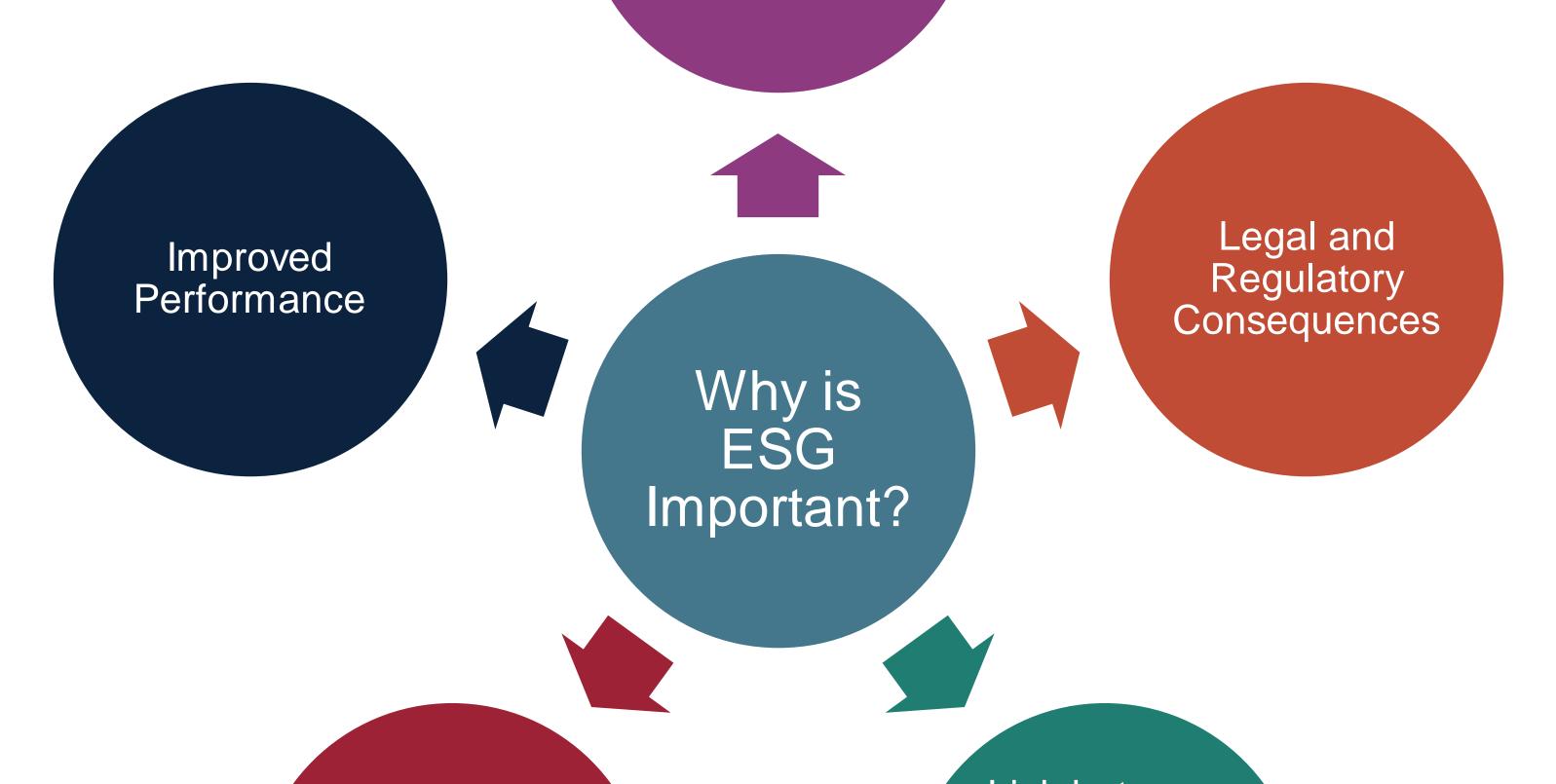
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What is ESG?

Responsibility for ESG should permeate through the organisation

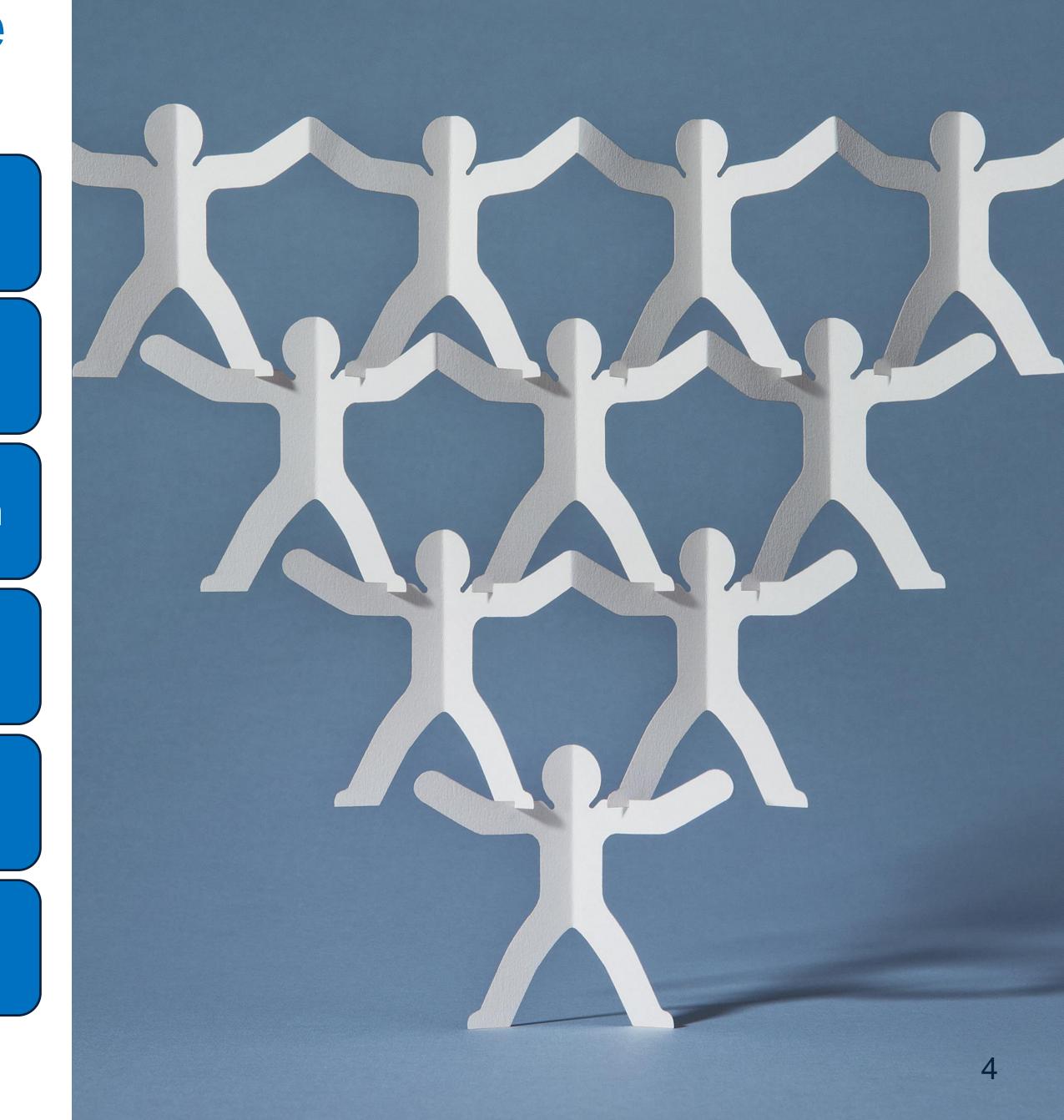
Consider appointing a governor as ESG champion

Remember: inaction today impacts tomorrow's generation

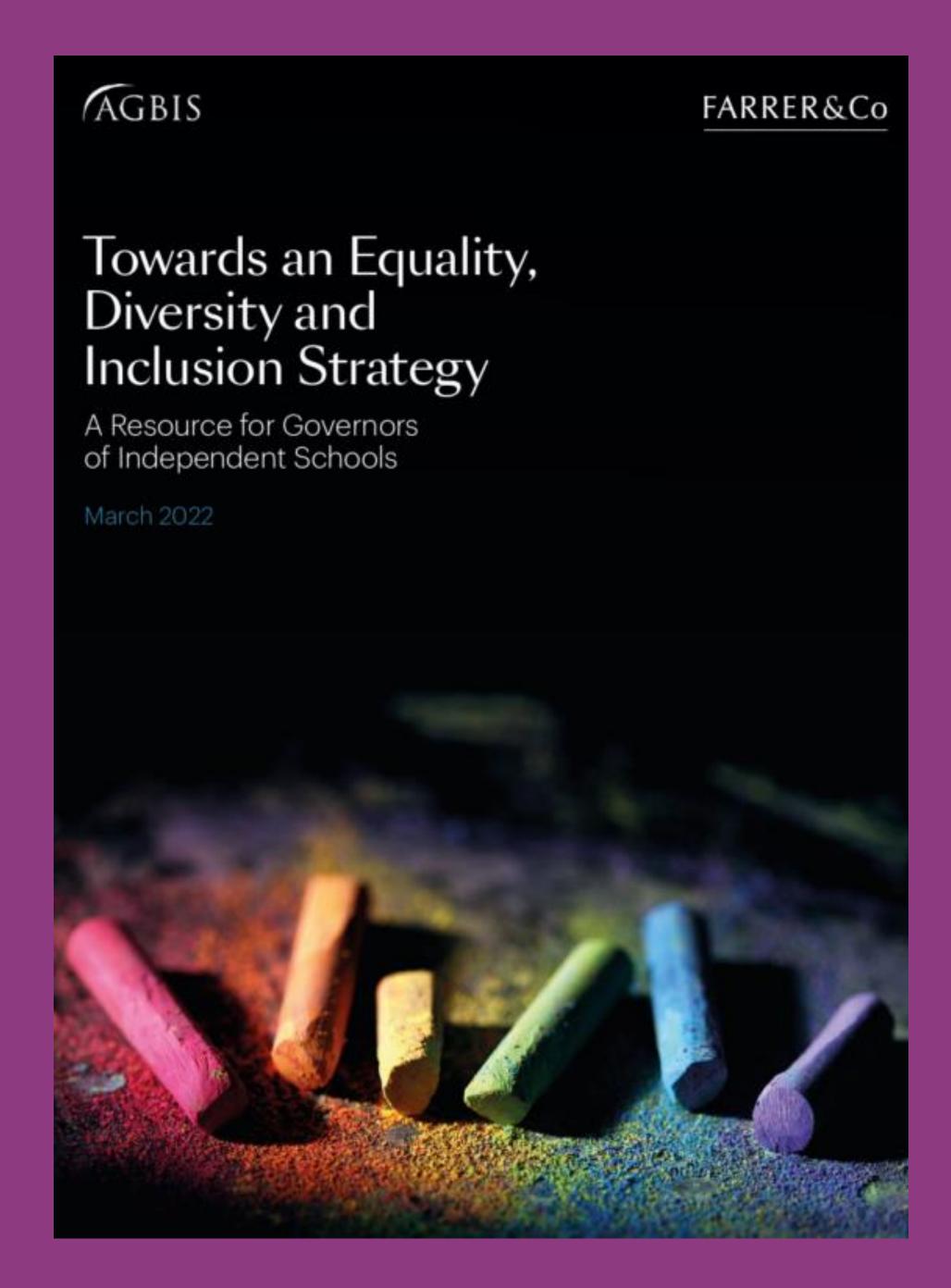




Take a closer look at Social: Employment examples

Have an Equality Diversity and Inclusion strategy.

Family Leave – a more generous, enhanced offering can have a positive impact on staff morale and retention



Take a closer look at Social: Employment and Environmental

Green Employment Contracts (e.g. digital only) Consider environmentally friendly benefits (e.g. cycle to work scheme)

Consider making a commitment to ESG an obligation for leaders in their contracts

Incentivise staff to use their holiday sustainably

However, be careful not to be overly intrusive or make unilateral changes

Take a closer look at Environmental

Energy efficiency improvement audit

Carbon reduction target / commitments

Encourage green transportation (e.g. provide cycle storage / EV charging point)

Conduct more thorough due diligence on contractors as a condition of hire

Recycling and waste management audit

Food efficiency review to reduce waste

Carbon footprint assessment of the School and its suppliers

Obtain independent accreditation of your green credentials
